#### **ROGER FURMAN**

IT WAS 1964 when Roger Furman founded the New Heritage Repertory Theatre as a nonprofit, community performance group that he ran for 20 years until his death at age 59. His was a career that broke boundaries in theater, film, television, books, and the perseverance needed to start and support a Harlem based theater company.

Furman had been working with HAR-YOU ACT, an antipoverty program in Harlem and sought to offer theater in the Black community. What resulted were more than 35 plays, the development of technical and financial support, and, in the end, an institution that has survived and continues.

Furman had studied theater arts at The New School for Social Research, and served apprenticeships at the National Theatre of Puerto Rico and the American Negro Theatre. But the reality, as he said, meant "I do stage design, acting, carpentry, filmmaking, directing and playwriting. A designer of a community-based theater must be versatile."

The theater's most acclaimed works included those he wrote or directed, though he also acted.

Pérez specializes in the styles of the Oriente province, where its cultural richness is the infusion of Afro-Haitian influences into a vibrant Afro-Cuban context. For the past 20 years, La Mora has been a Harlem resident. She has taught Afro-Cuban dance classes in New York City: The Ailey Extension program, Cumbe African & Diaspora Dance & Drum and Djoniba Dance Center. She has served as guest instructor and choreographer for dance programs outside New York City, such as the summer program at Humboldt University. In 2004, La Mora founded Oyu Oro, an Afro-Cuban Experimental Dance Ensemble in New York City, the only Afro-Cuban dance company of its kind in the USA.



SIPHO KUNENE & WOZA MASEKELA is the group led by drummer Sipho Kunene comprised mostly of musicians who have toured and recorded with South African jazz legend and political activist Hugh Masekela. "It is our intent to carry on the legacy and spirit that is Hugh Masekela. He made an indelible imprint on all of our lives. A teacher, mentor, friend and brother, he will always be with us, and with the world."



**ATUSHI -TOYA- TOKUYA** Composer, arranger, keyboardist, and producer, TOYA, was born in Tokyo, Japan. With a rich career spanning over 100 Albums and numerous concert tours alongside renowned Japanese artists. TOYA relocated to NYC in 1991. His collaborations include musical direction and keyboardist roles with icons like Ben E. King, Dionne Warwick, Maxine Brown, and Chuck Jackson. A long-time collaborator with Ben E. King, TOYA produced King's final album. His versatility extends to film music winning the "Best Music" award in 2023. TOYA also composed three original ballet suites for Saint Louis Ballet and is currently working on his musical, "Gravity Of Love" to be produced by New Heritage Theatre in 2025.

**OBEDIAH WRIGHT BALANCE DANCE THEATRE** Internationally known Creative Director, Audelco nominated Choreographer, Master Teacher, and storyteller is a Native New Yorker and a proud Julliard Alumus. 





## **VOZA** Executive Producer RIVERS Reflections on the Legacy of Theater and Visual Art

In 1964, I had the pleasure of meeting Roger Furman, a playwright, set and scenic designer, and director. This meeting was held as part of a class on public speaking at the Harlem YWCA on West 125th Street in their intimate auditorium. The guest speaker, Roger Furman, spoke nostalgically of the 1940's and his days in the American Negro Theatre (ANT). He shared the history of Abram Hill and Frederick O'Neal, cofounders of ANT and the actors who were part of the company. including Harry Belafonte, Ruby Dee. Ossie Davis, Isabel Sanford, Gertrude Jeannette, Clarice Taylor, Rosetta Lenoire, and himself to name a few.

The ANT's goals were to develop a permanent acting company thoroughly trained in the arts and crafts of the theater, focusing on their natural talents and gifts as African Americans, and to present productions that mirrored Black society with integrity and relevance to its audience's current life. Roger Furman was brilliant in romanticizing that period. I was so moved by his presentation that evening that I, as a volunteer, joined New Heritage Repertory Theatre, a new theater launched by Furman, which was based on the ANT model, 1964-1965 was a time of social and civil unrest all across the country. Two of the movements that were also going on in Harlem during that time was a fervor in Black communities that "Black is Beautiful," and the Black Arts Movement.



There was an organization named the African Jazz Arts Society and Studios (AJASS). Within that group were the Grandassa models, featuring full bodied women with dark skin, kinky hair and full lips. They proclaimed their female models as beautiful and Black wearing clothes by some of the most talented and creative Black designers using traditional African fabric and African inspired fashions. You could visit local libraries, museums, night clubs, cafes and stroll down 125th Street and see that there was a change coming and that change involved moving away from the Eurocentric image as a litmus test for what beauty is in communities of color.

During this time Roger created the New Heritage Repertory Theatre. The Black Arts Movement started percolating and voices like Leroi Jones. Larry Neal, Nikki Giovanni, Sonia Sanchez and others inspired Black writers, visual artists and others to be more active in their communities, highlight their "Africaness," their history, their traditions and their culture.

Theater groups, poetry performances, visual artists, musicians, and dancers were part of this movement and we were able to highlight multiple types of expressions through the media that was captured in our theaters, art galleries, newspapers, and clubs. In the middle of this movement, Roger opened our first home at 35 West 125th Street in a two-story loft. One of the first things he did in designing our new theater space was to reach out to local visual artists to create a montage of Black faces that framed the entrance to the theater. This was the first time I noticed the collaboration between visual artists and theater in creating a cultural environment.

In that same building, across the hall, I would hear African drumming daily. Roger and I walked across the hall to meet our neighbor Master percussionist Babatunde Olatunii in his studio and it felt like we had walked into an African village. Adorning the walls of his studio were huge murals and images created by a group of visual artists known as the Weusi Artists Collective, a group of African American visual artists who embraced African images, prominently using them in all of their creative endeavors. Since that time I have met a number of Weusi artists- Ademola Olugebefola, Oko Pyatt, James Sepyo, and others.

These artists became integral in the development of the Black theaters that began to sprout up. For example, in 1968 Emmett Wigglesworth designed the interior and exterior of the Bedford Stuyvesant Theater, Ademola designed collateral and promotional materials for several New Heritage productions and sets for the New Lafayette Theatre and the New Federal Theater. James Sepyo was a recipient of an Audelco Theater award for his set designs.

The collaborations between the visual artists and theaters still exist today. Both of these mediums- theater and the visual artssymbolize the reflection of our community's values and our culture.

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




### NEW HERITAGE THEATRE HARLEM & COMMITTED ARTISTS SOUTH AFRICA






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

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#### UNHEARD NOTES MUSIC FOR PEACE, LOVE & HARMONY 4TH ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL PIANO COMPETITION FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

UNHEARD NOTES PIANO PARA 2018 is an international piano music competition showcase and concert for 33 pianists with disabilities from 14 countries who have overcome great challenges. Today, the New Heritage Theatre Group's work is rooted in the nomenclature and vocabulary of our culture. Numerous articles and awards presented to the New Heritage Theatre Group and IMPACT Repertory Theatre validate the important work that we are doing. Our reputation for being change agents with the ability to impact our community for the better is legendary. Our productions mirror the world we live in and are immediately recognized by our multi-racial multicultural audiences.

Our productions focus attention on what is happening around us and pay attention to topical issues such as gentrification, social justice, and politics. Post-gentrification, the Harlem community continues to stress the importance of our cultural institutions to connect to our legacy of achievements and our enormous contributions to the global culture of America. Inspirational news of the incredible accomplishments of our writers, actors, technicians, and directors have made, and continue to make, their mark on the local and global stages.

One of our unique characteristics is that after theatrical performances, documentary film screenings, and music presentations, we conduct audience talk-backs and receive feedback from our audiences. This allows our writers, directors, and actors an important tool to grow and improve their craft. The post-show talkback with members of the cast, our creative team, and the audience is an intimate and interactive presentation, which captures the nuances of our playwrights, directors and actors and informs their creative process when dealing with issues of social unrest, humanitarian initiatives, political upheaval and discrimination.

In most theatrical performances, audience members see a play. Lights come up and people exit the theater. At New Heritage Theatre, after the performance, the lights come up and a dialogue between what the audience saw and experienced begins to happen. The audience begins interacting with the cast, directors, playwrights, and actors.

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The audience members get a chance to share and critique the presentation.

However, on numerous occasions, audience members also share personal connections and reflections on how the performance truly impacted their lives. We believe that the Hero's Journey is supposed to be a cathartic experience for the audience. New Heritage Theatre's productions offer this intimate and cathartic exchange after many of our presentations and these types of talkbacks are simply not available in other mainstage productions.

The New Heritage Theatre Group has always remained mindful that we are centered in an extraordinary community for people of color. Our goals and mission is as relevant today as it was in 1964 when Roger Furman founded New Heritage Repertory Theatre. In fact, the ability to present and capture Harlem's historic culture and its people was the driving determination of our founder. From Roger, we learned the importance of respecting the American Negro Theatre as the foundation for our work.

Our Team continues to reach back and connect with our American Negro Theatre legacy by revisiting and presenting their historic works to today's audiences.

New Heritage Theatre Group's vision remains an integral part of New York City's theatrical community and because of our unique programming, we continue to partner with Lincoln Center, The City College of New York, Hunter College, Columbia University, Robert F. Smith Performing Arts Center, Harlem School of the Arts, The Inter Church Center, First Corinthian Baptist Church, and the Schomberg Center for Research in Black Culture.

Today, New Heritage Theatre Group is challenged to insure that our theater continues to exist and sustain itself in the midst of a rapidly changing demographic community with new residents arriving daily. Our golden responsibility as the oldest not-for-profit Black theatre in New York State is to maintain our commitment to first-class entertainment and educational presentations. We must continue to deliver relevant and topical issues through performances that capture and document our iconic history through our arts and culture, both in film and on stage. We must continue to inspire conversations with our actors, playwrights, and audiences to give voice to those creatives who have shared their stories and allowed us the honor and privilege to present their contributions to society and the world. The one thing that distinguishes the theatre from all the other arts is that a theatrical performance is a fleeting moment, it not permanent. But unlike other art forms, the theatre has one special characteristic. It is always possible to start again. The theatre's lack of permanence teaches us that in other areas of our lives, there is always the possibility of starting over. The slate can be wiped clean, relationships can be mended, and hearts can be healed. In this way, the theatre and life are one and the same.
